2022 Legal Services Corporation Justice Gap Report: Prevalence of Civil Legal Issues Throughout the Nation

Most low-income households have dealt with at least one civil legal problem in the past year – and many of these problems have had substantial impacts on people's lives.

3 out of 4 (74%) low-income households experienced 1+ civil legal problems in the past year.

1 in 2 (55%) low-income Americans who personally experienced a problem say these problems substantially impacted their lives – with the consequences affecting their finances, mental health, physical health and safety, and relationships.

Most common types of problems: consumer issues, health care, housing, income maintenance.

Seeking and recieving legal help

Most low-income Americans do not get any or enough legal help for their civil legal problems.



Only 1 out of every 4 (25%) Americans have a civil legal issue that substantially affects their life.

46% of low income individuals did not seek legal help for one or more problems, primarily due to the worry about costs.

1 in 2 (53%) of low income individuals do not know if they could find and afford a lawyer if they needed one.

Low income individuals do not get any or enough legal help for 92% of the problems. Most of which have a substantial impact on their lives.

Comparing Income Groups-Individuals with High Incomes

People with higher incomes have fewer barriers to getting legal help.

People with higher incomes are more likely to seek legal help for problems with substantial impact (32% vs. 25% of problems).

They are more likely to believe that they can use the civil legal system to protect and enforce their rights (59% vs. 39%).



Statistics from the Field

1.9 million requests for legal help.

1 in 2 requests for legal aid or pro bono assistance is turned away due to limited resources.

Even when legal aid organizations can assist, they only have the resources to resolve only 1 out of every 2 (56%) problems.

All in all, LSC-funded organizations are unable to provide any or enough legal help for an estimated 1.4 million civil legal problems (or 71% of problems) that are brought to their doors in a year.





How Unmet Legal Needs are Impacting Our Community



On the West Coast

11.1 million people below 125% of the federal poverty line (FPL).

72% of households had 1+ civil legal problems in the past year.

How Unmet Legal Needs are Impacting California

55 percent of Californians at all income levels experienced at least one civil legal problem in their household within the past year.

Californians received no or inadequate legal help for 85 percent of their problems.



Most common legal issues involved health, finances, and employment.

Californians gave multiple reasons why they did not seek legal help.

The most commonly cited reasons included:

o Lack of awareness that their problem was a legal issue;
o Belief that they needed to deal with the problem on their own;
o Fear of the legal system;
o Worries about cost; or
o Uncertainty about where to look.

Why Pro Bono is Needed Locally

- 40 percent of low-income Californians reached out to legal aid organizations, but only 30 percent had assistance.
- State Bar-funded legal aid organizations employed approx.
 1,500 attorneys and leveraged pro bono services from
 16,000 others.

PRO BONO

• <u>An additional 9,000 full-time legal aid attorneys are</u> needed to fill the service gap.
