VAWA REQUIREMENTS

- Legal Status of Batterer
- Legal Marriage
- Good Faith Marriage
- Resided with Batterer
- Domestic Violence
- Good Moral Character of Applicant



VAWA BENEFITS

- Deferred Action
- Employment Authorization ("work permit")
- Children under 21 included for spousal VAWA applicants
- Public Benefits and federal financial aid once Prima Facie Notice Received
 - See All County Information Notice 01-07-15 and GEN-10-07
- May apply for lawful permanent residency ("greencard")
 - For LPR abuser relative: when priority date is current in visa category
 - For U.S. Citizen abuser: immediately

CASE EXAMPLE

Sue is married to an undocumented man with whom she has been living for 5 years. He has been physically abusing her for 3 years. She has 2 police reports of DV and they have 2 children together. She has several convictions on her criminal record and some don't appear to be related to the DV.

Would she qualify for a VAWA self-petition?

U VISA

Provides a path to legal status for survivors of serious crimes who have suffered harm as a result

AND

cooperated with law enforcement

U VISA REQUIREMENTS

- Applicant suffered qualifying criminal activity
- physical or mental abuse as a result
- possesses information regarding that activity
- has been, is being, or is likely to be helpful in the investigation
 OR prosecution of that activity
- criminal activity violates laws of U.S. or occurred in the U.S.



U VISA BENEFITS

- Lawful U nonimmigrant status for 4 years
- Employment Authorization ("work permit")
- May apply for lawful permanent residency ("greencard") after 3 years
- Certain family members can be included
- Public Benefits once U visa (USCIS Form I-918) Receipt Notice received

CASE EXAMPLE

- June entered the U.S. with her mother when she was just a baby. When she was a teenager her mother needed to return to her country of birth. Her uncle offered to care for her so she could remain in the U.S. June began living with her uncle and cousins. Her uncle told her she needed to babysit their two children, as well as clean the entire home, and do the laundry by herself for everyone living in the household. He also made her work long hours in the family restaurant for no pay. June's work day lasted from 6am until midnight each day and she regularly had to miss school to work. Her uncle constantly controlled her movement and told her she was lazy and ungrateful. He said she would have to pay for the blender she accidently broke when she was making food for the family and always reminded her that she'd be homeless if she didn't "earn her keep."
- What type of crime has she survived?

TVISA

Provides a path to legal status for survivors of a severe form of trafficking in persons ("human trafficking")

AND

who report to law enforcement (and meet other requirements)

T VISA REQUIREMENTS

- SUFFERED SEVERE FORM OF HUMAN TRAFFICKING
- * Severe = Meets the Federal Definition of HT
- COMPLIED WITH REASONABLE REQUEST FROM A LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCY FOR ASSISTANCE IN THE INVESTIGATION OR PROSECUTION OF HUMAN TRAFFICKING
- PHYSICALLY **PRESENT IN THE U.S. ON ACCOUNT OF** THE TRAFFICKING
- * Does not require trafficker to have brought survivor into U.S.
- WOULD SUFFER EXTREME HARDSHIP INVOLVING **UNUSUAL AND SEVERE HARM** IF REMOVED FROM THE UNITED STATES



T Visa Benefits

- -Lawful "T" nonimmigrant status for 4 years
- -Employment Authorization ("work permit")
- -Access to Public Benefits (once determined to be a trafficking survivor so before T Visa is filed)
- -Ability to apply for lawful permanent residency ("greencard") in 3 years, or less if DOJ letter obtained
- -Certain family members included

COMMON MISUNDERSTANDINGS ABOUT HUMAN TRAFFICKING

- Smuggling # Trafficking
- The survivor does NOT need to cross international or state lines
- Trafficking survivors are born both inside and outside the U.S.
- Physical restraint or kidnapping is NOT required
- Trafficking is NOT limited to forced sex work—it includes forced or coerced labor of any kind
- Trafficking is NOT limited to illegal businesses and underground industries
- Traffickers can be intimate partners or family members

What about undocumented people who aren't eligible for any form of immigration relief?

Do they have rights?

YES!

EVERYONE LIVING IN THE U.S. HAS CERTAIN BASIC RIGHTS UNDER THE U.S. CONSTITUTION

- ✓ You have the right to remain silent.
 - ✓ You might want to carry a know-your-rights card & show it if an officer stops you.
 - ✓ Exercising your right to remain silent will protect your immigration options but lying will hurt them.
 - ✓ If you do have valid immigration documentation, you might want to carry a copy.

- ✓ You have the right to speak to an attorney.
- ✓ You have the right to review documents before you sign.
- ✓ You have the right not to open the door to your home.
 - ✓ ICE must have a warrant signed <u>BY A JUDGE</u> (NOT a DHS official) to enter your home.
 - ✓ ICE must show you the warrant, which can be held up at the window or slid under the door
 - ✓ If you are worried ICE will arrest you, you might choose to tell the officer if you have a medical condition or children.

Be prepared and **CREATE a SAFETY PLAN**

- ✓ Memorize the phone number of a friend, family member or attorney that you can call if detained.
- ✓ Make a plan for those you take care of if you are detained, such as children or older adults.
- ✓ Gather valuable documents and keep them safe with a friend or family member.
- ✓ Make sure your loved ones know how to find you if detained by ICE. If you have an "alien registration number" (A# listed on all immigration documents), make sure it is written down in a safe place and keep it with someone you trust.
